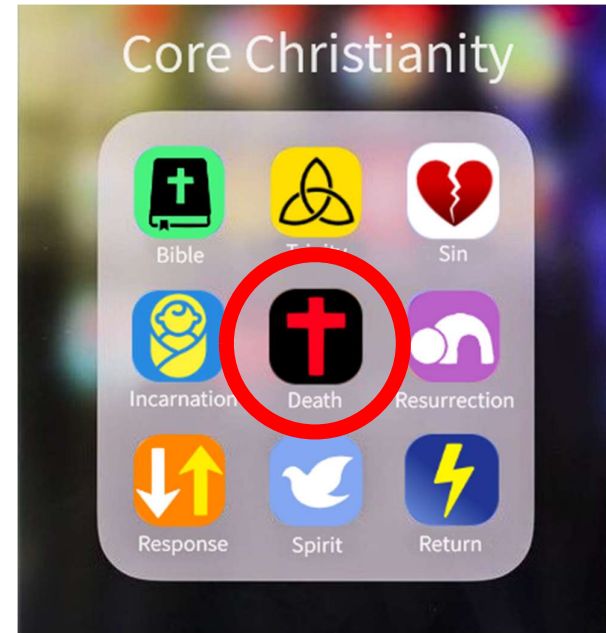


JESUS' DEATH (2 CORINTHIANS 5:14–6:2)
