STUDY 5 — DAVID AND THE KINGS

THE STORY SO FAR

As a whole group together try combining your efforts to retell the story of Studies 1, 2, 3 & 4 but this time try to make it more interesting (by highlighting special events or problems or unusual parts or taking turns to tell different episodes). You can use stories, drawings or diagrams.

WHAT WE MISSED ALONG THE WAY

Today's study is about the kings of Israel. We will focus on King David but lots has happened along the way. So let's look at what we missed.

After Moses led the people out of Egypt, they arrived at Mount Sinai and God gave them the 10 commandments and instructions to build a transportable temple called the Tabernacle. God gave them these two things as an agreement between God and the people. Because God had rescued them from slavery, the people of Israel were not to worship idols, they were to worship only God by obeying the 10 commands. However, God also knew that they will not be able to follow these commands so God gave them the temple rules and rituals as a way to forgive them when they sin.

But the people were really sinful and they complained about God. So God punished them by making them wander around the dessert for 40 years until a whole generation died. During this time God was literally their leader, the people would go wherever God took them. When the generation that complained against God had died, God gave them the land which He had promised Abraham. They lived in the land but they had no King. God was their King. Whenever they got into trouble and the people around them attacked them, God would raise up a 'judge' to rescue his people. This was how the people lived for many years in the land. God was their King. But life in the land was not all good because the people did whatever their hearts desired. Sin was still a big problem.
